Congratulations to Naaman Tammuz, winner of the first prize of £2500, an Apple Macbook, a day shadowing Dr. Roger Highfield and a 6-month subscription to New Scientist. Significantly, this year's Science Challenge contained a major outreach element, with over 180 schools taking part in a separate category with a chance to win £1000 and an iPod. We attracted significant sponsorship for this competition and a distinguished panel of judges composed of over 60 Imperial academics, and a final panel of Lord Robert Winston, Dr. Simon Singh MBE, Dr. Roger Highfield and Dr. Raj Persaud. I would like to thank Shiv and the Outreach Office for all their help, and especially Ray, Flo and Dan for their tireless work and support.

It was great to see that almost 50% of entries came from postgraduates, pointing a way forward for faculty unions to engage with this section of their constituents.

We received a flurry of positive comments from very senior members of College staff who were visibly shaken by the enormity of what had been achieved in such a short amount of time.
