# **DPEW Report**

A note by the Deputy President (Education & Welfare)

This might be a bit brief *(I got carried away after I said that)* and a bit late *(um... sorry!)* but in order for me to finish all the things I am doing at the moment so I can report them to Council on Monday I need to spend less time writing a report and more time actually doing them. I think that made sense.

## Meetings

Since the last Council I have attended several (hundred thousand) meetings. The most notable ones of which are:

## Environmental Strategy Meeting

Steve, a number of members of ESoc and myself met with Graham Watson from College to discuss College's Environmental Strategy. This meeting was primarily to talk about waste strategy and came out with some very positive ideas. Talks of composting got Adele Peel particularly excited and we had assurances that student input would be welcomed for the implementation of the project. I have since taken to stalking the corridors of other London Colleges taking photos of recycling facilities to ensure we are better than them!

## **Residences Committee Meeting**

This meeting brought some interesting statistics to the table and results of surveys from students living in halls of residence last year. I will be following up in the coming weeks any changes implemented as a result of this analysis and have requested more data from residences. The data will be discussed at the Union Accommodation meeting in a few weeks time.

## Westminster Fairtrade Meeting

This meeting occurred at King's College on the Strand. I invited some local Fairtrade Activists to attend and this brought experience from other Boroughs who have already achieved Fairtrade Status. There was good turn out from imperial with the only other student members to turn up! King's, LSE and Imperial will be working together to develop a strategy to help other London Universities gain Fairtrade Status and contacting members of the community, faith groups, trade unions and local industries based in Westminster to put pressure on the Council to work towards becoming a Fairtrade Borough.

### Student Portal Project Board

This is one of my favourite projects and is drawing close to completion! The student Portal will enable students to more easily navigate their way around the college intranet and use online resources more efficiently. The Portal will eventually bring together library, registry, outlook, timetabling online learning and other services under a single sign in. I have been asked to present the Student Portal to a number of committees in the coming months. This will involve giving presentations from Faculty to Management Board level.

### MADSAC

The Medical and Dental Student Advisory Committee was again a very positive meeting. I was pleasantly surprised at the amount of input I was encouraged to give and have been invited to submit papers to the next Patient Consultation Group at the Medical Centre. This will have the aim of developing a closer working relationship with the medical centre and more collaboration of resources and efforts for upcoming welfare campaigns.

# College Website

I was invited to attend a meeting with College Communications along with the Union Communications and Sponsorship Manager to advise on important facilities for the student areas of the new college website. The website will be launched in December and looks very smart, colourful and welcoming. # **Campaigns Meeting**

In preparation for the first meeting of RWB I held a campaigns pre-meeting to bring together people interested in hosting campaigns this term and to put forward proposals to the first meeting. This was very well attended and brought up lots of exciting ideas which were then taken to RWB for their approval.

# RISE Week

RISE will be taking place from 5<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> November. The theme is 'Realise Equality, Celebrate Diversity'. Chiraush Patel, Equal opportunities Officer, has been nominated as Campaign Coordinator and some initial interest has been generated from volunteers. I hope we can try and engage more people to get involved over the next week.

We are looking for people to be filmed for interviews on the new college website around the issues of 'Integration on campus' and 'Imperial from an International Students Perspective'. We will be taking photos to make a collage showing ethnic diversity on campus and showing foreign language films at ICU Cinema. There will also be promotions on international food in ICU Catering.

# SHAG Week

SHAG Week is 26<sup>th</sup>-30<sup>th</sup> November and will see an exciting collaboration between Medsin, Positively Red, Sexpression and the Representation and Welfare Board. # **Representation and Welfare Board**
