Imperial College Union President's Report A note by Ashley Brown

Note: this is a revised version of my April 26th report with additions. As half of Council didn't bother replying to their emails, I presume half of Council didn't bother to read the report either.

Matters Arising

At the Senate meeting on 12th May, we again raised objections to zero-weighted first years, as mandated by Council previously. Engineering Studies Committee had approved zero-weighting in Bioengineering, and I highlighted that Senate had previously agreed that Biology was to be a pilot, with a review taking place once that was decided.

At the same meeting, the Student Agreement in Medicine was extended to 2nd and 3rd years.

Phase 3

On the last day of term we were given the go-ahead by College to take out the steel column which would have obstructed the view of the stage at Metric. There seems to be agreement that not removing it would come back to haunt us later – if you're going to do a job, do it properly.

As a consequence the builders moved in to start stripping out dB's the following week, and on the 16th April began to dig new foundations. We were trying to get as much of the noisy work out of the way as soon as possible, while many students are were away from campus. There will be some further noisy works taking place during the term as we drive new piles to support the building with the column removed.

The column-removal stage has had to proceed well in advance of the rest of the programme. It has the added bonus that we'll get to see a lot of the internal structure of the room before committing to final designs, making it less likely that we will uncover something unhelpful during the construction process.

We have distributed 3D renders on the Phase 3 blog (**imperial**college**union**.org/**phase3**) and in Felix, with a very positive reception. A number of people have commented on the furniture – we'd raised the same issues they have when we saw the renders, but the furniture in the diagrams is only illustrative. A meeting on 13th May discussed furniture in detail, both for the bar and the club. Note that we intend to go for furniture in the club which can be removed later in the evening as the dancing gets going, but that also caters to the sports teams. We think we have a solution!

Elections

Nominations are open for officer elections, except Welfare Campaigns Officer (which we want to abolish) and International Officer (which we would like to move to RWB). I am returning officer and Court is still drawing up an elections committee..

We have re-opened nominations for the Deputy President (Education), as Meera Ganeshadevan stood down after taking a summer placement with Credit Suisse.

Volcano!

I've been sitting on the "Volcanic Ash Task Force" in College, which will be monitoring how many students have missed or are likely to miss exams due to the volcanic ash cloud of doom.

Departments that are able to have moved exams, others will arrange additional exams at the end of term. Keep an eye on the College website, as the situation is currently fluid.

It seems that the problem is not as great as originally thought, and departments seem to be handling it very well.

There is a transport policy being presented to this meeting which will give the Executive Committee oversight of the minibus fleet. It has already passed a list of standard fines, as allowed by the policy, as CSB has failed to do so over the past 3 years.
