Introduction

Position: Life Member

Manifesto: I was the first medical student to be elected President of Imperial College Union in 1997, and came at a time of great upheaval for the College and Union. I was made an honorary Life Member in 1998. Returning to undergraduate studies until 2003, I led the first 'No2NUS' campaign in 2002, a position that I'm pleased to see the Union has come back to! I secured the Beit basements for the Union in 1998 and remained a member of the ICU Council, becoming its Chair in 2002.
