The Law and Order Committee

Highlights from the meeting on the 7th June:

Both the disability and food focus groups took place on the 2nd. The disability group produced good feedback which was on new and different issues which was great. The food group was not good – few people came and they came for the free food and gave unproductive feedback. We’re thinking having it more centrally advertised and run by College next year will boost uptake and make it more effective.

I want Welfare to be more

Accessible

- Regular Advice Centre stand in the JCR/SCR to improve awareness of available support

What happened? The welfare stand failed. People weren't interested and didn't know what it was for. I'm advising next year's DPW to create a really attractive stand regularly manned with welfare officers, with welfare officers well trained to be helpful and engaging whilst there.

- Support all student Welfare officers with training and advice

What happened? I did create some training this year, but it was quite late in the term. I want to expand it for next year with advice from Counselling on how to deal with students sensitively as well as more formal E&D training.

- Review the Buddy Scheme

What happened? I tried to make the scheme more centrally run this year, but the depsocs wanted to do it different ways so I left it alone. Hopefully the academic for a will highlight best and worst buddy practice in preparation for next year.

Engaging

- Online debates and discussion of contentious issues

What happened? This ended up being not important enough to focus on – a nice idea but not a priority.

- Encourage more club involvement in campaigns like Green Week and One World Week

What happened? This did happen – we had a lot of great events run by a lot of different clubs – VegSoc and KnitSock to name a couple.

- Greater emphasis on student volunteering

What happened? Heather and I worked really hard and got the Projects system properly up and running . Individual, non-Project based opportunities have been supported by CV2012 which I've been an active part of.

Open

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- Advertise the student's right to attend Union meetings and create a monthly mailing list (briefly!) summarising meeting agendas

What happened? We've made a consistent effort throughout the year to publicise Union meetings in Felix and the newsletter which can be built upon for next year. The mailing list was a good idea that didn't really happen although Jenny's done something similar with the Council summary.

- Actively gather and incorporate student's opinions into major policy change discussions

What happened? I've spent a lot of time coordinating surveys and focus groups throughout the year, so I hope I've done this.

- Better publication of critical policy changes

What happened? We've made an effort to publicise changes to policy such as the changes to the Environmental policy – however, this could definitely have been done more.

Postgrad Friendly

- Annual postgrad welfare surveys, with problems brought to the attention of supervisors

What happened? I incorporated postgrad issues into the new welfare survey I helped create – we had a good PG response with useful data collected.

- Better support for and integration of all postgrads within and between departments

What happened? I've helped solve individual PG welfare issues, but it's been the GSA that have done really run with this year.

- In particular, focussed welfare provision for female and international postgrads

What happened? Realistically, I think this is going to take a number of years to come to fruition, as support for any postgrads is still so new.
