The City & Guilds Week was born this year under the mutual goal of all CGCU committee members: Integrating Engineers. The objective of this event is to bring engineers together in light-hearted competitions while providing good opportunities for us busy engineers to relax themselves during one of the busiest times of the year. The format of the event was engineers could play mini-games set up by us on Queen's Lawn daily to score for their departments; the highest scored department each day could win treats and the highest overall scored on the last day could win a free bar night.

The initial planning started in December 2013, when I first started to approach department representatives, presidents and events officers (or equivalent) of each engineering society for their collaboration in this event. 6 out of 7 of the departments were able to send at least 1 representing member to form the City & Guilds Week Organising Committee, also formed from several chosen members from the CGCU Committee and myself.

The first meeting was held in January and it took place weekly until the event commenced. Members were allocated with various duties and all were fulfilled beyond expectations. Slight communication issue was identified. A meeting involving relevant people was arranged and the issue was resolved successfully.

The event was held daily from 3rd March to 7th March. A marquee, generously provided by Team Bo, was set up on Queen's Lawn daily (except Wednesday) as a base for the event. Different mini-games. DJ's and performances were arranged each day to attract audiences. For instance, the following is the schedule of the week:
