

CGCU Summer Sabbatical Report A note by the City and Guilds College Union President – Tim Munday

The first thing to note here is that the City and Guilds College Union President receives a paid sabbatical for 8 weeks during the summer holiday. These were distributed to all home students along with the Big Unions Welcome Pack, while international students had the opportunity to pick up a copy from our stand at Freshers' Fair and during our departmental talks.
