MOTION TO CONDEMN THE SCRAPPING OF MAINTENANCE GRANTS Proposed by Andrew Tranter – Campaigns Officer Seconded by Jennie Watson – Deputy President (Welfare)

ICU Notes:

- 1. That all student maintenance grants have been scrapped and replaced by loans.
- 2. That according to the Student Loans Company, 41% of students were previously eligible for the full maintenance grant in 2014/15, while another 14% were eligible for a partial grant.
- 3. That the Institute for Fiscal Studies estimates that the 41% of students previously receiving full maintenance grant will on average, for a three year course, graduate in about £53,000 of debt. Previously this was around £40,500.¹
- 4. That this change was not debated or voted upon on the floor of the House of Commons, but rather by the Third Delegated Legislation Committee. After a 90 minute debate, the final vote was 10 MPs in favour, 8 against.²
- 5. This means that the entirety of student maintenance grants were scrapped by a vote of eighteen people.*
- 6. That this has been widely condemned by the NUS and other student unions.

ICU Believes:

- 1. That education is still a right, not a privilege.
- 2. That many students rely on maintenance grants to survive, let alone have a decent quality of life.
- 3. That scrapping maintenance grants is fundamentally unjust, and will shift the balance of payment for the student loans system from rich to poor.
- 4. That forcing a change of this magnitude through a tiny committee, rather than allowing it to be scrutinised properly, is an astonishingly huge abuse of democratic channels.

ICU Resolves:

- 1. To condemn and actively campaign against the scrapping of maintenance loans.
- 2. To work with other student unions and organisations to oppose the scrapping of maintenance loans.
- 3. To mandate the DPW to enact this policy.
